## From the Office Desk

Have you ever found yourself asking, What's next for me? My husband and I found ourselves in that very place—not lost, just uncertain. We began to wonder if it was time to hang up our boots and ease into retirement. But every time we considered it, there was no peace. Then, something incredible happened.

Over the past year, different people—on different occasions—spoke the same words to us: "God's not finished with you. He has more for you to do."

Shortly after, we were invited to attend the OMS Asia/Pacific Conference in January 2025 in Thailand. It became clear this was the beginning of something new—a fulfilment of those repeated words. Meeting missionaries, field leaders, and staff from across the globe, we were struck by something beautiful: **so many of them were in our age group.** 

Curious, we asked several couples why they were still serving on the mission field. Their answers were simple yet profound: "Because we feel free to serve God." "Because we can."

There was no mention of age, no thought of limitations. Instead, there was freedom, joy, and a deep sense of purpose. Watching others our age live by faith, serve with passion, and carry no burdens of retirement-age expectations lit a fire within us. We felt truly connected to their joy.

We returned home to New Zealand with renewed excitement and energy. The message had sunk in: **you are** never too old to serve God, and never too old to serve in missions.

This reminder kept coming. As I took on a team leader role in OMS after the departure of our director, this opened doors for me to help missionaries prepare for the field, as well as travel to Greenwood, USA for the OMS mission council meetings.

Our newest missionary and many of those that I met at Greenwood were of similar age to me. God was confirming His message again and again: "I'm not finished with you. There is more to do." And we believe it.

#### Scripture reminds us in Luke 10:2 (NIV):

"The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

Wherever you are in life—whether you're in your 30s, 50s, or well into retirement—God can use you. He still wants to use me. He still wants to use you.

## Tere Eestist - Hi From Estonia!

"Two years ago this August, we arrived in Estonia. As a couple, we see various ways that our ministries in Spain, Russia, and Ukraine have prepared us for this time and place. We desire to invite all people to come and to know God deeply, follow Him faithfully, and love their neighbours as Christ has loved us.

Our primary ministry is teaching at the Baltic Methodist Theological Seminary in Tallinn. We teach courses in Healthy Church Planting and Development, Discipleship, Theology of Missions, Spiritual Formation, and the Bible. Our students come from more than nine countries, speak one of three languages: Estonian, Russian, or English, and vary in age, ministry calling, denomination, and Christian experience. We are privileged to have this opportunity to share God's heart and Word with a new generation of leaders who will then mobilize ordinary church members into God's mission in His world.

We also reach out to make disciples through our leadership of an English Bible study fellowship at the Tallinn Methodist church. This fellowship has members from eight countries; and through our partnership with a Ukrainian couple, we also host an evangelistic English speaking club each Friday evening. Half of the club members are refugees from Ukraine, so God is graciously allowing us to remain connected with a nation we love and for which we deeply grieve.

Brent continues to coach an Estonian couple (Allar and Piret) who have been effective in training people to develop and lead small groups in several Estonian towns. They describe their ministry as a 'slow-motion revival.' Over the past two years, fifty-three people have turned to Jesus through witness of Christians, who a few years ago had no idea that God could use them in any special way. This is reason for great rejoicing in the spiritually hard ground of Estonia which is rated one of the least religious countries in the world.

Globally, Colleen facilitates access to discipleship training opportunities for OMS missionaries and remains at the ready to encourage colleagues near and far. We recently hosted a mission team from the USA who helped paint an historic church, so there is always a place for you to serve here if God calls. Watch this space as we grow the potential for short term trips here!

Please pray for us as we continue to teach, guide, love, and serve the community that God has lead us to in this small northern corner of Europe. Pray also that those we touch will go on to touch others with the love, truth, and forgiveness of God offered through faith in Jesus."

## When you're willing to go.

The growth of all the teenagers over these two short weeks was obvious. We received feedback about their "newfound confidence in prayer, sharing, and worship", and how they grew in their faith. One of the girls shared, "I am enjoying reading the Bible now, and doing Bible studies with my friends." There was also a glorious observation of "seeing everyone's joy even in the midst of hardship."

Much of their time in the villages they visited was spent with the children, leading them through programs where they "sung songs, told Bible stories, danced, shared testimonies, and played games." It was clear how much fun the team had with the kids, and what a joy it was to bring the love to Jesus to these little hearts.

Alongside serving in 5 different villages, the team had the opportunity to impact their peers as they ministered to an assembly of teenagers at a local high school. A couple of the team shared their testimonies, then they performed songs and skits pointing to how the Creator of the universe values them.

Team leader Nicole shares the impact she saw on this trip and it is beautiful!

"There is a Māori proverb that came to mind as we journeyed through this outreach trip:

# "He aha te mea nui? He tāngata, he tāngata, he tāngata." "What is the most important thing? It is people, it is people."



## A Journey of Faith and Fellowship

In June, I had the privilege of attending the OMS Mission Council and Board meetings for OMS USA and OMS Global in Greenwood, Indiana. This trip was both a challenge and a blessing—a true step beyond my comfort zone. Having never flown alone to the United States, I faced many unknowns: unfamiliar airports, uncertain connections, and the question of whether I would know anyone at the conference.

**New Missionary Alert: Asi** 


**Praise God!** We are excited to be sending out our newest missionary, however this is someone who is certainly not new to the mission field. We are honoured to be with him as he makes his return to a country he once served.

For security purposes, we can't share his name so we will be referring to him as R.M. who will be serving in Asia. He will officially leave New Zealand in September 2025 so as he starts off this new season, we decided to ask him a few questions.

### **INTERVIEW**

1) What is the best way for developing and multiplying churches in the country in which you will serve?

The church (i.e. the body of Christ) faces many challenges in the country where I will go to serve. The



constitution guarantees freedom of religion but subsequent laws make it very difficult to build church buildings. The church also suffers from religiosity and over-dependence on theologically-trained leaders. One of the things that has great potential for developing and multiplying churches (i.e. congregations) there, would be developing a template for house church meetings (which are technically legal in the country where I will be serving) with a focus on discipleship and ability to share one's faith.

### 2) Why do you think God has called you to go and serve in your retirement years?

I used to serve overseas but had to return to New Zealand to look after my elderly parents. They have both gone to be with the Lord now and I feel a call to return. Part of it is to fulfil prophecy spoken over me when I was much younger. The fact that it is my retirement years is more a reflection on me, in that it tends to take me a long time to come to a firm decision.


#### 3) How can people best support a missionary?


Definitely by prayer support and financial support. Also by offering hospitality when they return home on furlough.

4) If someone was thinking about serving as a missionary, what advice would you give them? Seek the Lord wholeheartedly. Seek the LORD and His strength; (Psalm 105:4). Talk to those who you look to as your spiritual oversight. Don't be put off by the lie that God no longer uses Western missionaries. Learn as much of the language as you can. If suitable resources aren't available for learning the language of the country you are thinking of going to, I would recommend the book LAMP (Language Acquisition Made Practical).


Please be praying for R.M. as he begins their next season of ministry. We know God will use him well to further His Kingdom.


